Dear Parents and Guardians,

I am pleased to report a school in very good heart. There has been an invigorating energy and a great deal of enthusiasm all round at Northampton High. We had a fabulous Dance Festival where we were left in awe of the inspiring performances and the range of formidable talents and abilities that exists across the school. It was a vibrant celebration of dance, music and creativity where our students showcased their choreography and dancing skills in a range of styles.

Their hard work and dedication shone through in every moment of the performances, and it was truly a feast for the senses. The stunning Music Examination Recital which left the audience captivated by the dedication to music that our senior students possess, and their ability to push themselves to build their confidence and to perform some technical and expressively challenging pieces. The Year 7 Showcase which consisted of speeches, poetry and song celebrated the impressive start that students have made since joining the Senior School at Northampton High. They presented their work to the audience, providing details about the different skills they have developed and knowledge they have acquired; an achievement in itself, as this was the first time many students will have presented to such a large audience!
