Art, Craft and Design (Senior)

It feels right this year to begin with a total. At the time of writing this, we have sold £2,108.00 as a result of our Spring Collective exhibition. 20% of this figure will be donated to The Hope Centre, Northampton. The satisfaction of helping others, alongside giving our students an opportunity to be professional artists, gave us great pleasure. Creating the work, framing, mounting and pricing are all part of the learning process on how to be a professional artist. We look forward to entries from our wider community next year, as we invite parents and governors to consider their artistic talent, and join us for another wonderful charity event.

The Spring Collective and Arts Festival are, of course, the culmination of our teaching and learning in school. Once again, the full breadth and depth of materials, tools and techniques have been selected by students, including mod roc hybrid creatures, wire sculptures, clay figures, photographic screen printing, drypoint engravings, oils on canvas, acrylics on board, film, digital painting and, of course, the many choices of tools we have for drawing. New purchases and developing areas of study include the use of Adobe Illustrator to prepare designs for linocuts, safe wash oil-based inks that professional artists use for inking up lino plates and analogue photography. We are recommissioning the darkroom so that we can build on our current offer of digital and analogue photography. It has been wonderful to see how the students have handled manual SLR cameras, as they carefully consider the exposure triangle, using black and white film.

Year 7 have created colourful drawings and paintings, and Year 8 ceramic sculptures have been built from insightful design sheets, on which ideas for transforming sculptures into lighting were considered. Year 9 have impressed us with their independent ideas during their pre-GCSE project, and their flower drawings are exquisite.



Year 10 and Year 12 are creating outstanding books for coursework, and we are delighted by their independence and commitment to generating fresh ideas. I conclude with Year 11 and 13 who have excelled. We are incredibly proud of their achievements and this can be seen through our vibrant school-wide exhibits and, of course, through the 'Portfolio' publication, which showcases the work of Art and Fashion & Textiles GCSE and A level students. We look forward to this special publication in the autumn term.

Art and Design (Junior)



The Junior School is an exciting place to showcase the creative talents of our girls. We celebrate the diverse artistic skills and achievements of students in all areas, including singing, acting, art and cookery.

Singing is an excellent way for children to express themselves and develop their musical abilities. From singing in choirs, to performing in musicals, our pupils are encouraged to explore their vocal talents, and develop their confidence on stage. The recent Year 6 production of 'Alice in Wonderland', and Key Stage 2 participation in the 'Voice in a Million' concert at Wembley Arena, are highlights those involved will remember for a long time.



Acting is another popular area that Junior School girls enjoy exploring. Whether they are performing in school plays or participating in drama activities and assemblies, acting is a fantastic way for them to build confidence, improve communication skills, and develop empathy. Through acting, our pupils learn to step into the shoes of different characters, explore different perspectives, and gain a deeper understanding of the world around them. The Christmas plays, performed so delightfully by girls from Nursery upwards, were a truly charming way to start the Christmas season.

Cooking is a unique form of art that combines creativity and practicality. In Junior School, girls can learn valuable cooking skills, experiment with new ingredients, and explore foods from around the world. Cooking can help develop a sense of responsibility, time management, and organisation, while also promoting healthy eating habits. Cookery has been introduced as a weekly lesson to Early Years timetable, and is extremely popular as an after school club for Key Stage 2 girls, who enjoy making use of the excellent Senior School facilities.

Fashion and Textiles

The Textiles studio has been a vibrant, colourful and lively space this year. We have introduced a range of new creative projects including festival flag making in Year 7 and a footwear design project in Year 8 which has explored the shoemaking heritage of Northamptonshire. This project has been underpinned by a visit to the incredibly inspiring Shoe Gallery at the Northampton Museum and Art Gallery. Our year 9 students have explored a Japanese theme using hand-painted fabric techniques to create Kimono jackets whilst Years 10 to 13 have worked on personal themes for their coursework projects.







We have gained new studio space for our A Level Students in the Creative Hub, where our students have a personalised desk space from which to complete sketchbook work.

Our annual research trip to London with GCSE and A level groups was a highlight which included a visit to the V and A Fashion Gallery, the "Africa Fashion" exhibition and Liberty. Project work has explored diverse themes this academic year with students taking inspiration from Chinese Opera, Armenian Culture and the colour pink.

Sewing Bee Club has been well-attended by younger students who created upcycled fashion, cushion and Christmas cards.

Our fashion show assembly was well received with 30 students taking part as models, designers and dressers. This was a fantastic opportunity to showcase the skills and creativity our Textiles students have developed.

Food Preparation and Nutrition



In the school year 2022/23 we have already had lots of wonderful events taking place in our Food department, with, of course, plenty of delicious recipes making their way out the door too. Some highlights include:

In November, we hosted the first round of the 2022/23 Rotary Chef Competition with students from Year 7, 8 and 9 taking part. They were required to produce a 3-course meal within 2 hours. Dishes included: lamb curry with rice, coconut crusted haddock and Parmentier potatoes, apple and pear crumble, and mango mousse. Verity from Year 8, and Lucy from Year 7, went on to compete in the district round in February, at Bourne Academy, Lincolnshire. Both girls put their all into recreating their menus, and although neither progressed to stage 3, this was a fantastic opportunity to be a part of; well done!

In December, the long-awaited GCSE Borough Market trip returned after a three-year hiatus. The trip really is a celebration of food; exploring the stalls, observing all the produce on offer, and taking part in a fantastic workshop with Bread Ahead bakery. This year, the Year 11 students voted on the Japanese baking class, where we made a rice flour loaf, melon pan and cheese buns.

The GCSE students enhanced their understanding of bread making and departed with their tasty outcomes to enjoy with their families. We can't wait to go back again next year.

For Holocaust Awareness Week in January, the chosen recipe was a Jewish honey cake. A range of students took part and made these delicious mini cakes, which are traditionally made a few days ahead as the flavours and textures improve as they mature, but they did not last long! Jewish honey cake is a popular sweet treat when celebrating Jewish New Year or Rosh Hashanah. In March, Year 11 completed their cooking exam; they are required to produce three dishes within three hours. This year, all students chose the international staple food theme and their outcomes included arancini, chicken katsu curry with rice, ravioli, cinnamon buns with a caramel sauce, and tacos. This is not an easy task at all and they really tried their best to make the most successful outcomes possible; including presentation and portion sizing.





In the second half of the summer term, we are looking forward to hosting the Northampton High School MasterChef competition again, where students and members of staff are welcome to take part in pairs. This was a fun event last year and many wonderful dishes were produced with teamwork.

Music

Theatre

We had a very successful start to this academic year as the Drama department were delighted to host Kat Mary Productions for an exciting workshop on Kafka's 'Metamorphosis'. Year 10 Drama students were joined by another school to participate in a fully immersive workshop and show where the students were involved in every aspect of the story; they got to explore the text through the style of Brecht and Berkoff.

Throughout the year, the Drama department have been fortunate to visit a variety of theatres to watch inspiring theatre that both shocked and amazed our students. In the autumn term. GCSE students went to Leicester Curve Theatre to watch Shakespeare's 'Othello' which was beautifully adapted by Frantic Assembly. We then went to London's National Theatre to watch Arthur Miller's 'The Crucible' which Year 11 have been studying for their exam. The Music and Drama Departments teamed up to take 60 students to the West End to watch 'Wicked', the students loved the show. Lastly, we went to watch 'Ocean at the End of the Lane', which was an exciting and inspiring show which has allowed students to take ideas and use them within their own devised work.

Drama clubs have been vibrant throughout the year, starting with a Christmas performance from the Key Stage 3 Drama Club, in which they performed to the Junior School. The High Drama Club, consisting of Year 9 and 10 students, were privileged to participate in the National Theatre Connections Project where they rehearsed and performed the play 'Tuesday' by Alison Carr. The students worked closely as an ensemble performance creating a physical and chorus-led piece. The students performed at Northampton High where Macadie Amoroso, a National Theatre mentor, visited and supported our students to prepare for our second performance at The Royal and Derngate, Northampton.



The performance was wonderful, engaging and entertaining and received extremely well by all audiences.

During the spring, Year 11 performed monologues for Component 2 exam. The students worked incredibly hard and refined post-2000 monologues, which they had selected and blocked in preparation. GCSE students performed powerful and refined pieces in front of a visiting examiner. Also, during spring term, Year 10 students devised their own Component 1 exam performances. They have been working independently, researching and experimenting with a variety of ideas like shadow puppetry and physical theatre to get ready for their exam in June.

Throughout the year LAMDA classes continue to be a popular extracurricular addition, with many students preparing for their LAMDA grades in the summer term. The students range from Reception to Year 9. Since February we have been staging our production of 'Wizard of Oz'. This is being directed in collaboration with the students and Creative Arts staff who have risen to the challenge, creating a performance with puppetry and flair! We are looking forward to performing in June.

We have enjoyed another exciting year in English, beginning with a live-streamed author event in the autumn term, featuring Robin Stevens. In the lower years, congratulations went to Maysha Chowdhury, with Motunrayo Oguocha as runner-up and highly commended certificates received by Emily Gates, Kareena Rana and Ammara Zafar.

Further talent was on display with entries for the GDST Laurie Magnus poetry competition late in the spring term. All entries were of a high standard and struck a chord with the English department, with themes ranging from political views on the environment to love and friendship. Congratulations went to Hunsil Bhatt in Year 10 for her





beautifully comforting poem 'Down the Window Pane', which found solace in the simplicity of the natural world and a rain drop. In the younger years, congratulations went to Abigail Stran, for her poem 'My Poem'- we found this highly entertaining, with a lively sense of humour, keen observation and effective overall structure. Runner-up was awarded to Ammara Zafar for her poem 'High Tide Horizon', with its warm and comforting message, impressive use of biblical language and compelling structural choices. Highly commended awards went to two students, Emily Gates for her heart-rending poem 'Twisted Truth' about the trials of friendship and Rose Neville for her poem 'Underwater', which featured an intriguing dual perspective set above and below figuratively crashing waves.

Dance



We were absolutely delighted with the standard of dance at our annual dance festival in the spring term. The spectacular show included pupils from Reception up to Year 11.

A range of choreography and music from different decades allowed pupils to shine and showcase their talents. This year we entered several pieces from Reception to our Senior enrichment class, all choreographed by Miss Sinead. We are currently awaiting the results; the successful schools will get to showcase their work along with many of the GDST schools in the summer term.

The students' hard work did not stop there; we held our first Royal Academy of Dance Ballet exams on 22 and 23 March, the first since the pandemic, with many students taking live exams for the first time. Students from Junior and Senior School entered, and the results came back very quickly and are the most incredible marks, with students gaining High Distinctions and perfect scores in the Class awards.
