Summer 2023 saw the school's first Speech Day event in its new format, acknowledging the achievement and endeavour of pupils in that academic year. On 12 July 2023, Northampton High welcomed a capacity crowd into school for our

Speech Day and Prize Giving event. The special evening was an opportunity to reflect on an action-packed year and congratulate those who have shown true dedication to school life. We were honoured to be joined by keynote speaker, Mandy Hickson, former Royal Air Force pilot and Human Factors facilitator for this memorable event.

Delivering an inspiring and entertaining speech on the challenges she overcame to become a female fighter pilot, audiences were impressed by her perseverance and dedication, which led to her unique and fascinating career. Hearing her story of resilience and success was uplifting for pupils, parents and staff, and Mandy certainly set the tone for a noteworthy evening dedicated to celebrating their achievements. Many of the awards at our Speech Day and Prize Giving celebration recognised pupils for their curiosity, perseverance, independence, risk-taking and collaboration - the school's prized intellectual characteristics.

Extending further than timetabled subjects, the celebratory event also recognised pupils for outstanding co-curricular achievements and leadership responsibilities. Reflecting on the most recent public examination results, recent alumnae were awarded the Linda Mayne Award for magnificent GCSE results, and students with excellent A Level grades received the Marsden Gee Award.

Results 2023





This summer, we saw another year of very strong achievement at GCSE and A Level, despite the many challenges faced by students. Consistent with our well-established track record of superb results, this year we celebrated:

A Level Results - a striking 44% of all grades were A* or A, 76% were graded A*-B and 93% were graded A*-C.

GCSE Results - thirteen students (18% of cohort) achieved a 'clean sweep' of A*/A grades at GCSE. 42% of grades awarded were at grade 9/8 (A* equivalent), in addition, 56% of students secured an impressive 6 or more GCSEs at grade 9-7.

Congratulations go to each and every student, thanks to their teachers and to families for the tremendous support. The commitment and resilience of students is a testament to them all. We also pay tribute to our outstanding teachers who worked very hard and with great skill and professionalism to support our students both academically and pastorally.

Our Year 13 leavers have chosen a great variety of university destinations and courses. These leavers join the family of 100,000 GDST alumnae, spanning the world and every professional sector. Alumna of the Year nomination from Northampton High



We were delighted that Northampton High School alumna Baroness Manningham-Buller (Eliza) was nominated as a finalist in this year's annual GDST Alumna of the Year award. The prestigious accolade, previously awarded to Oscar-winning

actor Olivia Colman, fashion designer Mary Quant, and former Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis Dame Cressida Dick, recognises the many varied achievements of the GDST's alumnae, and we are thrilled that Eliza was considered for this year's award.

Baroness Manningham-Buller has enjoyed a uniquely impressive and fascinating career, which has led her to her current role as a Life Peer member of the House of Lords and Chair of the Conduct Committee. She is currently also co-president of Chatham House, a renowned Think Tank which helps governments and societies build a sustainably secure and just world. Eliza is also a retired British intelligence officer who worked in the Security Service (MI5) for more than 30 years, principally focusing on international and domestic counter-terrorism, and was Director of MI5 for some years.

Despite not the eventual awardee of the accolade, everyone at Northampton High congratulates Eliza on this amazing achievement.

Charity Fundraising



At Northampton High, charity fundraising is central to the life of the school. It is the students who drive the fundraising and we have to be mindful of how many charity events and activities we are able to sustain as part of our calendar. Our Deputy Head Girl for Partnerships and part of the Student Senior Leadership Team (SSLT, above) - this year, Risha B in Year 12 - canvasses pupils and staff at the beginning of the year, proposing a range of local charities as potential recipients of the school's fundraising efforts for the year, with all pupils and staff voting on their preferred local charity. This year, the chosen charity is Northampton Hope Centre (https://www.northamptonhopecentre.org.uk/), whose work helps people experiencing disadvantage, hardship, homelessness, addiction and mental health struggles to help themselves.



As reported in High News (8 December 2023), the major event for raising funds took place on 1 December 2023 - the Annual Christmas Fayre. Our Christmas Fayre raised no less than £3,231 this year with £2,447 being donated to Northampton Hope Centre with the proceeds from the raffle, tombola, silent auction and Santa's Grotto (above).

A further £784 was raised for the school's Astroturf project from proceeds of the festive refreshments and pitch fees from the Christmas Market. Piles of shoe boxes wrapped in brightly coloured paper and decorated with personal messages were amassed recently outside the Heads of Year office, with Year 7, 8 and 9 pupils diligently preparing their boxed Christmas gifts ready to donate through Rotary to children in Moldova.

While we try to focus on whole school charity initiatives - including the Macmillan Coffee Morning, Food Bank Collections for the Trussell Trust, Children in Need, the British Legion's poppy appeal, Save the Children's Christmas Jumper Day (below) in just the last few weeks - individual fundraising also takes place regularly in school, for example sales of baked goods and accessories to raise money for Jo's Cervical Cancer Trust, pre-loved clothes, freshly baked cakes and a book sale in aid of the Red Cross' humanitarian support for Israel and Palestine, amongst other important student-led initiatives. Through these charity drives, we gain a heightened sense of how fortunate we are, and learn



to reach out to each other, supporting those in need who do not have access to the life chances many of us take for granted. Autumn term's activities raised funds totalling an incredible £6,434 for a range of charitable causes! A huge thank you to our whole school community for contributing to this impressive total, but also for supporting us in our wider outreach efforts.

Transforming lives through bursaries



Northampton High School, as a GDST school, has a proud history of providing financial assistance towards school fees, ensuring that girls from all backgrounds have been able to access an excellent all-girls education.

Today, GDST is a leading provider of bursary provision in the UK with 10% of girls in the 22 independent senior schools from Year 7 through to Year 13 receiving financial support. There are more than 430 students in GDST schools on a full 100% bursary, and over 1000 benefiting from a bursary at any one time, enabling schools to reach as many girls as possible in their local areas.

The bursary programme is built on three pillars: Finding, Funding and Flourishing. Finding involves identifying those students who will benefit from our bursary awards the most. Funding - thanks to generous donations from our supporters, we are able to reach those families and students for whom a Northampton High education would be out of reach. Every student on a bursary is given every chance to achieve their full potential and flourish. They have access to everything on offer in school ensuring that there are no obstacles to participation for bursary students.

We thank those alumnae, parents, former staff and friends of the school for their ongoing support to our fundraising efforts. All those who have made this commitment join The Minerva Circle, a special society recognising their generosity.

Obituaries

Rev. Yvonne Chapman



It is with great sadness that we report the peaceful passing of Reverend Yvonne Chapman, former Deputy Head of Northampton High School for many years, on 31 August 2023 at St Christopher's Care Home in

Northampton, aged 87. Miss Chapman joined the school in Derngate in 1978 and served the school until retiring in 1993. Miss Chapman will be remembered for her quiet air of authority but also for her compassion, understanding, and deep faith which was evident in her teaching and in school assemblies. Having held the Deputy Head position for 15 years, the major task in her latter years at school was to work with the property and equipment committee to prepare the way for the school move from Derngate to the current school site in Hardingstone. This she did with vision, efficiency and a great attention to detail. It was a proud day for her and the school when Queen Elizabeth II opened the new buildings in October 1992. Yvonne retired from the school the following year but she continued her keen interest in the school and its activities for the rest of her life.

Miss Chapman was a remarkable individual who made an indelible mark on Northampton High School and the lives of countless students, staff, and parents. Just some of the comments from former pupils tell the story: "An awesome lady, who inspired respect. I remember her also being tremendously supportive." "[She] was one of the most influential ladies in my life". "She embodied all that was Derngate". "An admirable role model for us to look up to". "So pleased I was able to see her in later life at the Old Girls' Reunions."

She will be remembered not only for her dedication to education but also for her unwavering commitment to nurturing young minds and shaping the future of our school community. Yvonne trained as a teacher at Brighton Teachers' Training College as a secondary modern teacher in history. Her report said, "Miss Chapman will not be a 'showy' teacher but the kind who can be trusted to get on with integrity, dignity, and good preparation.

She will be a thoroughly good influence on both pupils and staff". Miss Chapman then explored a different sense of her vocation to teach and in 1958 she enrolled for the USPG missionary training course at the College of the Ascension, Selly Oak, studying religious education and mission. Following this, she set sail on a ship from Southampton to Bombay, in the October of 1960, at the age of 25.

Over the following years Yvonne worked in a number of different schools in the Diocese of Delhi developing a new programme of religious studies, going on to be appointed Religious Education Adviser to the Bishop of Delhi. She continued her studies with a degree in Religious Studies from the Serampore University in Calcutta. By this time Yvonne could speak and teach in Hindi and she helped to co-edit two books that were published by SPCK into both Hindi and English. The Archdeacon of Delhi at the time described Yvonne as an inspirational teacher who breathed new life into the schools and churches she taught at, enabling the start of a number of new Sunday Schools in parishes where previously none had existed. He said "she had the gift of helping quite ordinary people to discover that they could teach and was tireless in her efforts to train and encourage them".

Having spent nearly ten years in India, Yvonne took teaching posts in religious studies back in the UK before joining Northampton High School in 1978. During those years at the High School, Yvonne formed a deep and lasting friendship with Sylvia Lightburne which led to them buy a shared house together in West Hunsbury. Both Yvonne and Sylvia travelled extensively in their retirement visiting Australia, Jordan, Zambia and New Zealand amongst just some of their destinations. With the priesthood opening up to the ordination of women in 1994, Yvonne trained for ordained ministry in 1995 and was ordained deacon in 1996, then ordained priest in 1997 at Peterborough Cathedral. She served in the parish of St Luke and St Francis, Duston, for six years, developing outreach in the community and became chaplain to the Mother's Union and bellringers.

Miss Chapman lived a rich and fulfilling life and will be remembered by those who knew her for her inspiration, empathy and support. She played a pivotal role in pupils' personal and academic growth, and the legacy of Rev. Yvonne Chapman will forever be etched in the annals of Northampton High School's history. Her memory will forever serve as a source of inspiration.

Mrs Chris Musson

We are sorry to hear that Chris Musson, who did the eulogy for Gill Allen, died in November last year.

Mrs Chris Berry, who later became Mrs Chris Musson, taught Biology, Human Biology and PSHE at the High School for many years, and was an excellent teacher as shown by her first class examination results. She had a good rapport with the girls, who enjoyed her lessons. She was very supportive to girls who were struggling for any reason and several of these have commented that they would not have been successful in their examinations without her help.

Chris was very down to earth with everything she did, and made friends with girls and staff easily. 'She was such a great teacher', 'I have never forgotten how kind Mrs Berry was', and there have been many lovely comments about her on the school website.

She often accompanied Gill Allen (nee Williams) on school trips to foreign parts which were thoroughly enjoyed by all in the group. Chris was a great lover of sport, especially tennis, which she continued to play in her retirement.

Chris continued to lead a very busy life after leaving the High School, which she maintained until very recently. Even her beloved family members could find it difficult to find a time to visit her. She was a lovely lady and will be sorely missed by many.

Obituaries

Gill Allen

Mrs Gill Allen worked at Northampton High for 37 years with three Headmistresses – Miss Marsden, Miss Lightburne and Mrs Mayne. Starting in 1961, young, fresh out of college, Mrs Allen was Head of PE and also taught geography.

Hockey was probably Gill's favourite sport, but in 1961 hockey at the High School was not as straightforward as it is now. Although there were tennis and netball courts at the Derngate site there was no space for a hockey field. So, pupils were required to make their own way to the Racecourse for the lesson. Changing facilities were minimal and on a winter's day, this could be challenging! The school later purchased some land in Abington Vale, and Yorks coaches transported the girls and staff to the playing fields there. Miss Williams met her husband, Mick Allen, through this connection.

Mrs Allen's geography lessons were memorable - if about France, there were croissants, baguettes, pâté, crème caramel to sample. Her organisation was unforgettable too, and she organised the panoramic school photos, the school's centenary celebrations, speech days, buffets, after school events and Queen Elizabeth II's visit to the school when it moved to Hardingstone. When in Derngate, every September Gill organised for the whole school to walk to church to give thanks for the new school year, as well as arranging the walk to the Mounts swimming baths for the school swimming gala - somewhat reminiscent of St Trinians! Mrs Allen arranged for the school to travel on three cruises through the Independent Girls' School Association, arranged ski trips for pupils, coach trips abroad and at home for staff and friends.

Gill was also an active church warden, using her organisational skills to great effect for her famous parish lunches and teas. Her logistical talents and hosting skills were enjoyed at many a friend and family gathering. Gill was a huge asset to Carolyn White and the Old Girls' Association, and together, Carolyn and Gill planned the first January Reunion Lunch and the committee catered for it themselves. Carolyn fondly remembers, 'Gill did two fresh salmon and several lasagnes and the rest of the committee did the salads and the puddings. To start with there were probably less than 40 people attending so this was quite manageable. However, as the numbers grew steadily, this became harder and harder work. One year Gill was unable to attend and so it fell to me to do the salmon and lasagne. I never thought to order the salmon, and when the Tesco stores at both Weston Favell and Mere Way had no fresh salmon on Friday evening, I was at my wits end! I think I must have got them from Wellingborough in the end but I'm afraid that was the end of the self-catering effort.'

At Gill's funeral, Chris Musson (nee Berry) spoke of their 51 years of friendship and their many shared holidays, 'Gill produced booklets and information about the places to visit. Mick and I were tested about our knowledge, but usually we failed! We went to South Africa, South America, China, New Zealand to name but a few.' She concluded, 'Gill was a formidable person; she spoke her mind and she was, above all, a superb human being and friend.'

Set before the advent of the First World War, the series captures the rapid social change which began at this time.

Kathy Peyton began her career after attending art school, as a teacher at Northampton High School where she taught for three years. As a writer she was prolific, winning the Guardina Prize for the Flambards Trilogy and won the prestigious Carnegie Medal for The Edge of the Cloud, the second book in that sequence.

Still writing and riding well into her eighties Kathy was inspiring on many levels; her books will be enjoyed by young girls for many years to come and of course, we have copies of her books in the Senior Library.
